Ireland has a legacy of ICT engagement from Apple, IBM, and Intel to TikTok, Meta and Google. 16 of the top 20 global tech companies are based in Ireland, with 106,000+ employees. Ireland is the second largest exporter of computer and IT services in the world, accounting for €50+ billion annually.



## MED TECH

**THE MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY SECTOR IN IRELAND IS RECOGNISED AS ONE OF THE FIVE GLOBAL EMERGING HUBS.**

The sector employs over 45,000 people in Ireland and is the second largest employer of MedTech professionals in Europe, per capita. Ireland is one of the largest exporters of medical products in Europe with annual exports

of €13+ billion, accounting for 8% of total exports from Ireland. Ireland is the lead exporter, globally, of contact lenses and cardiac stents – and the 3rd largest exporter of artificial joints. 14 of the world's top 15 medical technology companies have a base in Ireland.

With over €15.4 billion worth of product exported worldwide, Ireland is a major global supplier of dairy products, such as butter, cheese and nutritional powders. Irish Agri-food companies are global players in their sphere and aim to be a world leader in sustainable food systems in the near-term.

It is home to over 430 international financial institutions in world leading areas such as aircraft leasing and fund administration.

We have 50 FDA approved pharma and biopharma plants. Over 30,000 people are directly employed in the sector and we have yearly exports worth €80+ billion.

**UCD is one of the top universities in the world according to the 2022 QS World University. UCD is ranked in the top 1% of higher education institutes worldwide.**

## Ireland's Most International University

With over **9,500 international students** from more than 152 countries UCD has the largest international student population in Ireland.

## Top Rankings in Subject Areas

In the 2023 QS World University Rankings by Subject, UCD ranked in the world top 50 in four subjects: Library & Information Management, English Language & Literature, Petroleum Engineering, and Veterinary Science. Alongside four subjects ranked in the Top 50, UCD has nine other subjects now ranked in the QS top-100 and, in total, 36 subjects among the Top 200.

UCD continues to be named among the best universities globally across 42 out of 54 subjects, and it remains Ireland's strongest institution in the league table.

- UCD established the **first Confucius Institute in Ireland** in 2006. It has been declared "Confucius Institute of the Year" three times.

## Number one for sport

UCD is an outstanding university for sports, with a community of athletes competing at elite levels of their sports. UCD also provides Sport for All to encourage all our students to get involved.

- **Athletics:** Four UCD athletes were selected for the World Indoor Championships in March 2022. Israel Olatunde (Men's 60m), Luke

- McCann (Men's 1500m), Darragh McElhinney (Men's 3000m), and Sarah Healy (Women's 1500m) were part of the selected 19 athletes to represent Ireland. Many Irish U23 records were broken by UCD athletes in so far in 2022; McElhinney in the 5,000m (13:17.17) and 3,000m (7:44.01), Healy in the 1500m (4:02.86) and 3,000m (8:46.14), and Olatunde in the 100m (10.26).
- **Rowing:** UCD graduate Katie O'Brien won a gold medal in the PR2 W1x, also in a new world best time, at the 2022 World Cup II in Poznan in June 2022. Eimear Lambe was part of the Women's 4 crew which claimed a bronze medal.
- **Ladies Hockey:** Seven UCD students competed and helped Ireland finish in ninth place in their first ever Junior World Cup campaign held in Potchefstroom, South Africa in April.
- **Rugby:** The Irish Rugby side who claimed this year's Under 20s Six Nations Grand Slam title had no less than 11 UCD Rugby representatives involved throughout the campaign. UCD's James Culhane was named the U20 Six Nations Player of the Championship. Former UCD Ad Astra Academy Elite Sports scholar Josh van der Flier was named the EPCR European Player of the Year for 2022.



# ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS AND STUDY SUPPORTS

**UCD offers a number of support services to students who need to improve their English language skills, either during their studies or in advance of starting their degree.**

## English Language Requirements

All UCD programmes are taught through English, and applicants must provide evidence of equivalent competence in English language through a recognised English language test, as outlined below.

- IELTS: An average score of 6.5 over all components and a minimum of 6.0 in each band on the Academic Version.
- TOEFL: A minimum score of 90 is required in the Internet-based TOEFL (iBT) with no less than 21 in writing and at least 19 in every other section. UCD TOEFL DI Code 0087.
- Pearson English Language Test (PTE): Minimum of 63 and at least 59 for each item in the Communicative Skills section.
- Cambridge Examinations: 176+ on Cambridge English scale (with no less than 169 in each skill and use of English). Acceptable Examinations: Proficiency Certificate, Grade C (i.e. CEFR Level C1 or C2); Advanced Certificate, Grade C (i.e. CEFR Level C1 or C2); First Certificate, Grade A (i.e. CEFR Level C1).
- Trinity ISE 3: At least merit in each skill category.
- University of Cambridge Local Examinations Syndicate (UCLES): English at grade C or above (incorporating the Oxford Examining Body's English as a Foreign Language (Higher Paper)).
- Cambridge English Language (1119) conducted overseas by UCLES (Malaysia): B4 or better.
- English Test for Academic and Professional Purposes (ETAPP): Grade C1 (i.e. CEFR Level C1 or C2).
- UK Examining Boards/Bodies: GCE O-Level English Language at Grade C or above, GCSE English Language at Grade C or above, GCSE English Literature at Grade C or above.
- Duolingo English Test (DET): A minimum DET score of 120 is required with at least 110 in each subscore.
- Other evidence of proficiency in English may be accepted, for example some high school exams (i.e. IB Diploma) or degree through English or English major. For further advice please contact UCD Global at [internationalenquiries@ucd.ie](mailto:internationalenquiries@ucd.ie).

## UCD Centre for English and Global Languages

The UCD Centre for English and Global Languages provides a wide range of language-learning programmes and services for all students. The emphasis is on the acquisition of communication skills to ensure that students develop the competence and confidence to use the target languages for study or work purposes. The ALC centre offers the following:

- Global Language Modules for all students. Languages on offer: Arabic, Chinese, English for Academic Purposes, French, German, Irish Sign Language, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Swahili.
- English language modules for Erasmus, non-EU/ Exchange and full time international undergraduate and graduate students.
- Pathway programmes (Pre-sessional and Pre-Master's programmes) that offer students the best preparation for their degree studies at UCD.
- An MA/Graduate Diploma in TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages)

### Pre-sessional English courses

UCD's Pre-Sessional Pathways help you gain your required level of English for entry to UCD degree programmes. They are suitable for students who:

- Need to improve their language skills as a condition of entry to their UCD degree programme
- Have already met the English Language conditions for entry, but wish to improve their proficiency and acclimatise to life and study at UCD before the academic year begins

### International Pre-Master's Pathway Programme (IPMP)

This programme is designed primarily for international students who meet the academic entry requirements of their chosen UCD graduate taught programme but do not yet meet the English language requirements for direct entry. The principal function of the Pre-Master's Programme is to prepare students to successfully undertake their chosen UCD Master's Programme by:

- **Increasing their English language skills** to the level necessary to undertake their UCD Master's programme, and
- Allowing them to become **familiar with how their chosen subject area is delivered** in UCD while also gaining experience of life as a UCD student before commencing their graduate studies.

**Note:** It is the responsibility of the applicant to check whether or not UCD ALC programmes meet entry requirements.

## International Foundation Year

The UCD International Foundation Year is specifically designed for international students who need additional study before starting an undergraduate degree programme at UCD. The programme consists of three terms. Each programme combines study skills, English language training and academic study to prepare you for degree-level study. We take special care to provide international students with the set of academic study skills that are required of domestic students but may not be taught in other countries, so that the transition to a different education system is as easy as possible for you.

Depending on the degree you want to access, you can choose from three routes:

- Business, Economics and Finance
- Engineering and Sciences
- Social Sciences, Arts and Humanities

On the programme, you will study four core subject modules and four subject-specific modules designed to focus on the academic areas most useful for your degree. ### English Language Preparation (pre IFY)

If you require additional language training before you start your UCD ISC International Foundation Year, you can first join the intensive Language for Study (LFS) course, taught at the International Study Centre. The course will improve your English language skills to the required level equivalent of IELTS 5.0.

If you have an IELTS level of 4.5 or equivalent, you will need one term of LFS. You can either start in July or September. At the end of your LFS course, you will not be required to retake your IELTS, but will progress to the International Foundation Year, providing you have achieved the required module grades.



# APPLYING TO UCD FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Applying to UCD is easy! With information online, and supports offered by our Global Centres and International Admissions Team, our application process is quick and efficient.

In addition to satisfying the general academic criteria, there may be further programme-specific requirements, such as proof of competency in mathematics (e.g. Engineering). Please refer to the programme pages for information on required or recommended subjects (e.g. French, Biology, etc.).

## Visas and Immigration

Some, but not all non-EU/EEA students require an entry visa for Ireland. You can check on the Irish Immigration Service Delivery website ([www.inis.gov.ie](http://www.inis.gov.ie)) for the list of countries that are not visa required. If your country is not on the list, then you require a visa. For example, USA, Canadian, and Malaysian students do not require a visa but Indian, Chinese and Russian students do.

If you are applying from China, India, Nigeria or Russia, please also check the Irish Embassy website for details of further documentation which may be required.

**Note:** *Ireland is not a member of the Schengen Agreement. You will, therefore, still have to apply for an Irish visa even if you have a visa for a Schengen country.*

All students from countries outside the European Union or European Economic Area, after they have registered with UCD, **must** register with Immigration Service Delivery in order to obtain a permission to remain in Ireland. This registration must take place before the expiry date stamped on your passport by immigration officials at the airport. This requirement also includes countries such as USA and Canada, which,

although they do not require a visa to enter Ireland, they are required to register with Immigration Service Delivery after arrival. Further information on registration will be provided at orientation.

## Medical and travel insurance

**Non-EU Students:** Because of the regulations of the Irish Immigration Service Delivery, students from outside the EU **must** obtain private health insurance. UCD does not arrange health insurance for students. You can purchase insurance in your home country; however you will need to ensure that it is valid in Ireland and in any other countries you plan to travel to.

**EU Students:** Students from EU Member States in possession of the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) are entitled to public health services in Ireland. The EHIC card is available from the health authorities in your home country. # APPLYING TO UCD FOR MASTERS STUDENTS

## Two types of Graduate courses are available at UCD, Taught and Research.

**Graduate Taught courses**, such as Graduate Diplomas, MA, MSc and ME, are taken by students who hold an undergraduate degree. The majority of the course will involve taught modules.

**Research courses**, such as Master's by Research or PhD, involve students carrying out their own research and academic study under the one-to-one guidance of their academic supervisor.

In all cases, to graduate with a Master's Degree, you will need to complete a dissertation or participate in a credit-bearing internship (in which case a report might replace the submission of a thesis).

### Admission requirements to taught programmes

The normal requirement is a recognised Bachelor's Degree at Second Class Honours, Grade One (2:1), or equivalent. Applicants should check the programme specific requirements as some degrees may require a higher standard for entry. For applicants who do not have the required minimum academic entry standard, a year-long qualifying course, such as a Higher or Graduate Diploma, may be available in some cases.

### Admission requirements to research programmes

For Master's by Research Degrees, coursework and examinations may also be specified by the College at entry. Normally these have to be satisfactorily completed in the first year of a Master's Degree programme.

To be eligible to enter one of UCD's PhD programmes, a candidate must have reached a high honours standard in their primary degree. In a significant number of cases, a Master's Degree may also be required. Specific information on entry requirements can be found on the relevant UCD School website.

### Medical and travel insurance

#### Non-EU Students

Because of the regulations of the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service, non-EU students **must** obtain private health insurance. UCD does not arrange health insurance for students. You can purchase insurance in your home country; however you will need to ensure that it is valid in Ireland and in any other countries you plan to travel to.

#### EU Students

Students from EU Member States in possession of the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) are entitled to public health services in Ireland. The EHIC card is available from the health authorities in your home country. ## STUDENT VISAS AND IMMIGRATION

Most non-EU/EEA students require an entry visa for Ireland. You can check on the Irish Naturalisation and Immigration Service website ([www.inis.gov.ie](http://www.inis.gov.ie)) for the list of countries that do not require a visa. If your country is not on the list, then you require a visa. For example – USA, Canadian, and Malaysian students do not require a visa but Indian, Chinese and Russian students do.

If you are applying from China, India, Nigeria, Russia, the United Arab Emirates or the United Kingdom, please also check the Irish Embassy website for details of further documentation which may be required.

**Note:** Ireland is not a member of the Schengen Agreement. You will, therefore, still have to apply for an Irish visa even if you have a visa for a Schengen country.



# SCHOLARSHIPS, FEES AND FUNDING

## Tuition Fees

UCD tuition fees vary according to the degree taken. They cover the cost of study at the University, as well as charges for registration, tuition, supervision, research consumables and equipment usage, examinations and graduation. **Important Note on Costs:** These costs are a guideline only and can vary greatly from student to student. The lowest estimate assumes campus stay, and excludes social and unforeseen expenses. UCD does not recommend that students budget according to the lowest estimate. An important cost to also consider is the annual cost for health insurance for non-EU/EEA students. This can range from €135 to €680 per year depending on your age and the duration of your course.

All non EU/EEA students **must** also register in person with the Irish Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) after arrival and after completion of registration at UCD. ISD will issue you with a residence permit/ card. As of June 2022, the fee for this card is €300 and should be included in your budgeting calculations.

## Loans

### US Federal Student Loans

UCD participates in the William D. Ford Direct Loan programme. Additionally, it recognises aid provided for US Veterans through the GI Bill. Students may also be able to access private loans and 529 plans, if necessary.

### Canadian Student Aid

The government of Canada offers Canadian Student Aid to full-time and part-time post-secondary students who demonstrate financial need in most provinces and territories across Canada. UCD is approved to administer these loans.

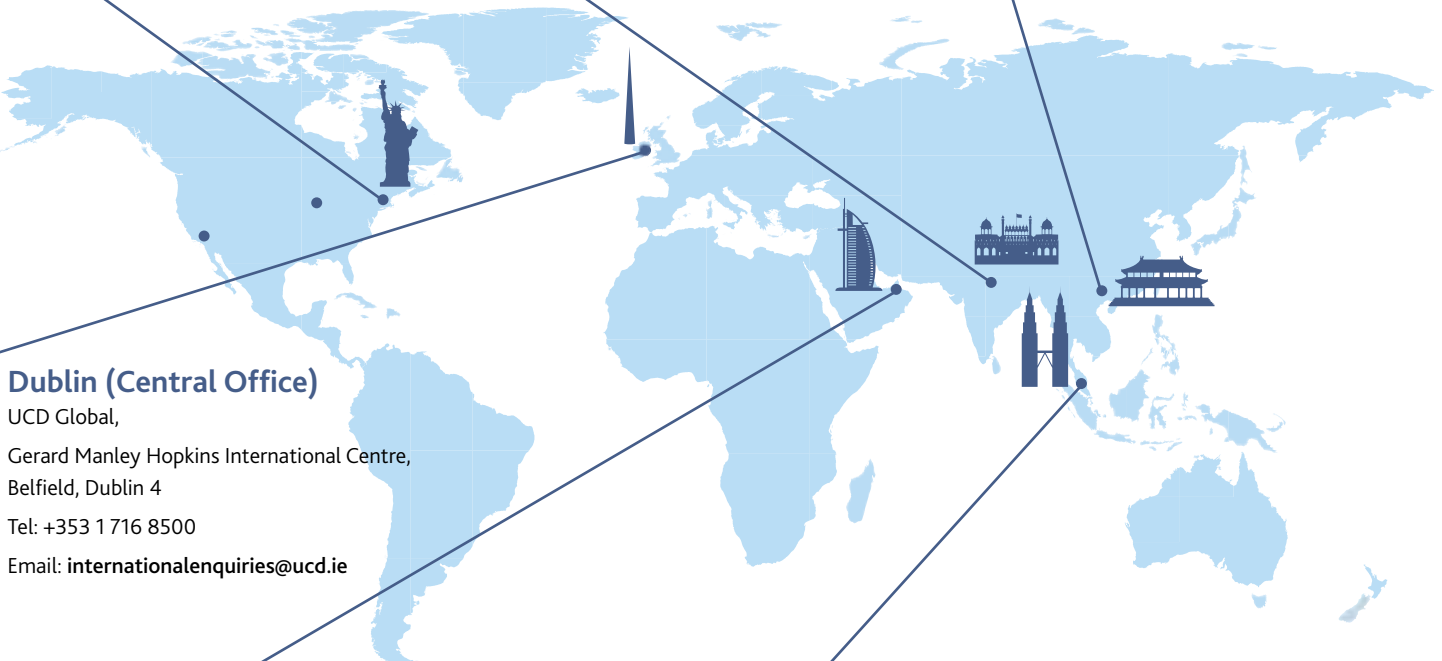

# STUDENT EXCHANGE & VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

UCD encourages undergraduate students to study overseas. UCD has over 450 exchange partners worldwide in over 40 countries, and when you go on exchange you remain a fully registered student of UCD with all of our student services available to you. There are also fantastic volunteer opportunities for students.

## Erasmus+ Exchanges

Students can participate in exchanges with partner universities in 29 countries in Europe through the Erasmus+ programme. Students on an Erasmus+ exchange are eligible to apply for Erasmus grant funding.

## Universitas 21

As a member of the Universitas 21 global network you can study with one of our Universitas 21 partners. These include the National University of Singapore, University of Auckland and University of Melbourne. Within Europe, there are Universitas 21 partner universities in Belgium, the Netherlands, Sweden, Switzerland and the UK. Alternatively, you can also choose other exchanges with universities in Canada, Hong Kong, Japan, New Zealand, Singapore and the USA.

## International Volunteering Opportunities

Established in 2003, UCD Volunteers Overseas (UCDVO) is a registered charity. It provides students, staff and graduates with the opportunity to participate in a volunteering and global citizenship programme. This includes four weeks volunteering (onsite or online) with one of UCDVO's overseas partners in India, Tanzania and Uganda. The programme also includes a structured series of global citizenship education workshops, relevant training and debriefing.

In collaboration with partners UCDVO creates opportunities for transformative learning and responsible volunteering for a fair and sustainable world. ## Internships

Many UCD programmes offer internships to students. An internship provides a great opportunity for you to get practical experience in the industry which is related to your field of study/interest.

An academic internship is an internship that you complete as part of your programme of study for which you receive course credit. These are only offered as part of certain courses, so you should read your course description carefully to see whether your course includes an academic internship. If this is the case, you will complete your internship either during your academic year or immediately afterwards and you will be contacted by an Internship Manager after your arrival to Ireland to find out more. The Internship Manager will support you to apply competitively for roles advertised.

If your programme does not include an academic internship, it may be possible for you to complete a non-academic internship during the summer months when students can work full-time. ## Ireland's Stayback Visa (Third Level Graduate Scheme)

This scheme allows non-EU/EEA students who have completed a qualification from Irish higher education institutions to remain in Ireland to seek employment. Undergraduate students have the option to extend their stay in Ireland for 12 months, while Masters or PhD students can extend it for 24 months.

Employers can hire graduates who are eligible to work for up to 40 hours per week. After 24 months, you may be eligible for the Work Permit Scheme. More information about this scheme can be found at

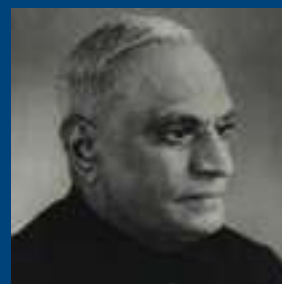
## Annie Atkins Arts & Humanities

# LIBERAL ARTS & SCIENCES PATHWAY

**International students have the choice of two pathways to a Bachelor's degree at UCD: Direct Entry and the Liberal Arts & Sciences Pathway. Liberal Arts & Sciences allows students who are not sure what degree they want to study to sample several subject areas. Over the course of four years, students can experience a range of different study areas before deciding on their degree programme.**



This programme offers you the flexibility to experience a range of different subject areas before you make your final decision on a degree. You can decide on your degree in Year 1 or 2.

Liberal Arts & Sciences is ideal for international students with diverse interests. If you are trying to decide between a degree in Science, Engineering, Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, Business, Agricultural or Food Science, Human Nutrition or Architecture – this course is for you!

This breadth of study in the natural, physical, and social sciences, arts, humanities and business is intended to enrich intensive study in your selected degree major. Through this process, you have the opportunity to discover subjects and ideas that may become lifetime interests, or that offer the creative stimulus to view your chosen degree from different perspectives.

Degrees are completed as a series of stages, which usually correspond to years of study. In Science, Agricultural Science, Social Sciences, Food Science or Human Nutrition, Stage One is usually completed in Year 1. In the other subject areas, Stage One is usually completed during Years 1 and 2.

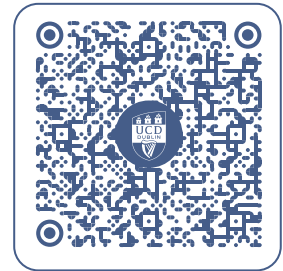

In all cases, UCD applicants who are granted EU fee status will only be admitted through the Central Applications Office (CAO) system and in line with CAO policies and procedures and National University of Ireland (NUI) matriculation regulations. If you are eligible for EU fees please contact UCD Registry-Admissions for further advice ([www.ucd.ie/askus](http://www.ucd.ie/askus)).

Students with UK citizenship and who meet the residency requirement will continue to be assessed for EU fees in the normal manner and should apply via the Central Applications Office (CAO). All other prospective applicants with UK citizenship who are assessed for non-EU fees should apply directly to UCD. The UCD School of Architecture, Planning & Environmental Policy brings together the disciplines of architecture, environmental policy, landscape architecture and regional and urban planning to provide a unique interdisciplinary teaching and research environment.

The School offers a range of undergraduate and graduate teaching programmes professionally accredited by the Royal Institute of British Architects, the Royal Institute of the Architects of Ireland, USA National Architectural Accrediting Board, the Royal Town Planning Institute, the Irish Planning Institute, and the Irish Landscape Institute.

On entering first year, you will be introduced to the idea of learning by doing. From the outset, there is a very direct relationship between acquiring knowledge and skills, and applying them.

In Architecture and Landscape Architecture, short exercises are set in the studio to help you acquire skills of observation, analysis and

understanding through the medium of freehand drawing and model making. As your skills in drawing, model making, surveying, scale and measurement develop, design projects of increasing complexity are introduced in which these skills can be applied. You will be involved in creative endeavour – proposing, testing and developing design ideas.

In City Planning & Environmental Policy you will be introduced to a host of new concepts and ideas. Building your knowledge and skills throughout the first year of the programme, you will progressively gain insight into the complexity of our taken-for-granted world and how we can constructively respond to the environmental, social and economic challenges we face.

There is a strong emphasis on group work and learning from your fellow students in a friendly and co-operative environment. Small class sizes, open-space studios, individual and small group tutorials all contribute to an exhilarating educational first year experience.



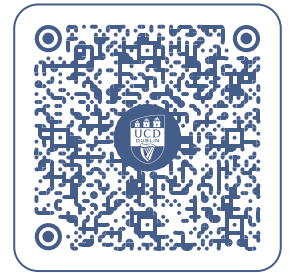

**BA Humanities** This four-year, innovative, multi-subject degree offers 13 distinct courses and students pick one course. Students learn within a carefully structured framework of related subjects. The BA Humanities has the added benefit of offering different ways to diversify your skills and broaden your horizons. In third year students can apply for an internship, study abroad, undertake a research project or take a range of modules at UCD. For courses and codes see pg 39.

**BA Joint Honours (BAU5)** This long-established three-year, flexible degree gives students access to UCD’s unrivalled range of 26 subjects. This course is ideal for students who want to create their own bespoke degree and combine a wide range of different subjects. On the UCD online application portal, students select BAU5 and pick two subjects (e.g Film Studies and History). A third subject or elective modules can be added during registration.

This degree is an excellent foundation for a range of further study options and careers. The Subjects & Combinations Grid below shows all available subjects and combinations for the BA Joint Honours (BAU5).

**BA Modern Languages (BAU4)** This four-year degree is designed for students who wish to study at least two languages: French, German, Italian, Spanish and Portuguese. A third language may be added on registration. Students will develop an advanced linguistic ability and a sophisticated level of cultural competence, enabling them to communicate fluently in a broad range of professional and social contexts. In third year, all BA Modern Languages students spend a full year abroad studying at one of our partner universities. This course is ideal for students who enjoy modern languages and want to live and work effectively in a multi-lingual environments.

## SCU1 Science

The SCU1 Science course is a common-entry course designed to offer flexibility to explore the full range of science degree subjects before choosing your final degree subject at the end of Second Year. In First Year, the degree subjects are categorised into streams and students then choose the modules to keep streams open which contain their preferred subject area(s). For students who may be undecided in First Year or are interested in degree subjects in multiple streams there is the Explore Multiple Streams option. The streams are as follows:

- Explore Multiple Streams
- Biological, Biomedical & Biomolecular Sciences
- Earth & Environmental Sciences
- Chemistry (includes Medicinal/Sustainable/Biophysical)
- Mathematics (includes Applied/Financial/Statistics)
- Physics (includes Theoretical/Astronomy & Space Science)

## CSSA Computer Science

This course is designed for students who wish to specialise in Computer Science or Computer Science with Data Science and want to pursue careers in software engineering, data analytics, the tech industry more generally, or research and development. There is no assumption that students have prior programming experience and all students will take introductory programming modules in First Year. At the end of second year, students have the option to select either Computer Science or Computer Science with Data Science as their degree subject.

## BSS3 Actuarial & Financial Studies

This course will prepare you for a professional career in the actuarial or financial professions, but it has also been designed to be broader and more diverse than most traditional courses in actuarial science. Students complete a professional work placement in third year in a financial institution or an insurance company.

Engage with the principles

There are four distinct ways of studying Social Sciences at UCD.

**BSc Economics – ECS4 ( 3 years).** This is a Single-Major degree for students focused on studying only Economics as a single subject.

**BSc Psychology – PCS2 ( 3 years).** Psychology is studied as a single subject degree. Accredited by the Psychological Society of Ireland this degree provides the foundation for further graduate training in any field of psychology.

**BSocSc Social Policy and Sociology – SBU2 ( 3 years).** This degree is a joint major in Social Policy and Sociology.

**BSc Social Sciences – SBU3 ( 4 years).** For this Social Sciences degree, you choose SBU3 Social Sciences on the application portal and then select your preferred option. Your subject choices are guaranteed. There are options to change subject choices at the end of first year if you wish. Please see the graphic below for the subject combinations.

Study Abroad is available as an option in our three year degrees. In our four year programmes, study abroad opportunities are integrated into third year.

UCD Veterinary Medicine is one of the leading veterinary schools in Europe. As well as having Irish (VCI - Veterinary Council of Ireland), UK (RCVS - Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons), European (EA EVE European Association of Establishments of Veterinary Education) and (AVBC Australasian Veterinary Boards Council) full accreditation, it has also been granted full accreditation by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), whose educational standards of excellence are recognised worldwide as the gold standard in veterinary education.

From the very start students will receive a strong grounding in normal animal structure and function, animal handling, welfare, nutrition breeding and management, ensuring you are well prepared for your later study. You will benefit from a mixture of campus based and off-site education. You will have practical sessions to help you learn about a wide variety of animal species safely and learn about their normal management, feeding and breeding. You will also have the opportunity to study elective modules from the wide range offered across the university.

## Transport Links

The Belfield campus is located 5km from Dublin city centre on the N11. With thousands of students and staff attending the University every day, there are many travel options from the various parts of the city, and indeed the whole country. Many bus routes service Belfield, taking you to and from the city, local suburbs and beyond. High quality, frequent bus services also serve the Clonskeagh side of campus.

The local DART station, at Sydney Parade, is within walking distance. It will take you north to Howth via the city centre and south to Greystones via Blackrock and Bray. A shuttle bus service between UCD and Sydney Parade Dart Station operates during term time between the hours of 8am to 10am, and from 4pm to 6pm. Please see [ucdestates.ie/commuting/getting-here/shuttle/](http://ucdestates.ie/commuting/getting-here/shuttle/) for more details.

The DART interconnects with the Red Luas line at Connolly Station/Busaras, which in turn connects with Heuston Station. The 145 Dublin Bus Route also offers a direct bus service from UCD to Heuston Station. The Green Luas line, at Windy Arbour and Milltown, is also within walking distance.
